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Editor's Notes

"The Circle of Learning" (about Rhododendrons) on April 3 was a big success, with over sixty members present. We were seated in a large circle in the Mel Couvelier Building.

It was still light outside and many members had already toured the rhododendron garden.

At the meeting, we were shown many beautiful rhododendron pictures of Kathy McKay's garden taken by Ryan Barry.

Norma Senn showed us how to build a simple solar water feature suitable for a balcony. She brought the solar pump bought through the ARS site of Amazon.ca on the internet.

The Circle of Learning began with the curator of the Rhododendron Garden at the HCP, Bill McMillan, giving us a brief talk about the overall needs of rhododendrons. He referred especially to the heavy soils and poor drainage of his garden at the Hort. Centre. The secret to success with such difficult soil is to "plant rhododendrons high", using well draining rhodo soil.

The second presenter was Calvin Parsons who helps Bill in the Rhodo Garden. Calvin spoke about pruning, sometimes referred to as "chainsaw" pruning, which drew some expressions of horror from our members. Several members have too large rhododendrons with blooms too high to see and tangles of branches from the ground. This habit shades out more delicate neighbours, often killing them.

Cutting the trunks of the big rhodos with chainsaws leaves rhodos looking horrible the first year but by the second year, many branches and leaves surround the cut and soon the plant is renewed by many blooms. Another method of dealing with too large rhododendrons is called "raising the skirts", where all the branches from the ground up to a preferred level are cut flush to the bark of the tree. Now companion plants under and beside the rhododendron can flourish and be seen. As well, air circulation around the rhododendrons is

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better and weevil damage is much less.

The third topic, growing rhododendrons in pots was discussed by Roy Blackmore. Roy is growing many Jim Barlup hybrids in big pots on his extensive sundecks. He uses very coarse bark mulch at the bottom of his pots, ensuring perfect drainage. Fir cones at the bottom of the pots also provide excellent drainage. Roy also fertilizes sparingly with well-rotted steer manure to ensure the plants do not get too big and he waters carefully (as we all do) in the summer.

Sharon Joseph brought up an unusual problem with the rhododendrons she grows on her balcony.

These plants are under cover from above, and do not get rainwater. Using tap water results in spotty growth for her plants. Other members had suggestions, especially if they have tried to keep tropical fish using city water. Basically, get the chlorine etc. out of the water by letting the water sit in a pail for several hours before use. Aerating the water before putting it on the rhododendrons is also helpful.

It was a lively meeting, with all sorts of participation and suggestions going around.





NOTES FROM THE BOARD

All committee reports were adopted as presented i.e. minutes, membership and financial.

Sharon, Theresa and Bill have been working on the archives of the VRS. The overall goal is to have these records digitized for preservation.

Calvin reported that the gardens at the Mary Winspear Centre are now the responsibility of the Town of Sidney. The grounds department will be overseeing the gardens as of last week and when time permits, a survey of any irrigation system that is currently in place. As discussed by board members, Calvin is tasked with the responsibility to pursue how the VRS may help with this project. The VRS has been given permission to have a weekend planting session when appropriate.

Calvin is developing a website that displays the photograph, color, bloom time and size of every Jim Barlup hybrid. It will soon appear on the VRS website. As well, he will develop a webpage advertising our annual sale. This will allow members to send this information to friends and through the internet.

The Mary Winspear Truss show is on the first weekend in May. Volunteers are needed to help set up on Friday, May 5 starting at 1 pm. Please have all trusses ready for labels. Our fancy vases will be ready to receive these starting at 2 pm. until 4 pm. Take down will be at 2 pm. on Sunday, May 7. Again, volunteers will be needed.

Our annual truss show is at our regular meeting on Monday, May 8. Please note the date change. The gardens at the HCP will be open at 6 pm. Entries for the truss show will start at 7 pm. All entries must be in place by 8:15 pm. Voting will start at 8:15pm. Each board member will ask an assistant to help with the counting of the votes. Coffee and Timbits will be served throughout the evening. There is a template in this newsletter allowing members to fill out their entry forms.

The Barlup Legacy continues to grow at the Marquardt farm. New board members were apprised of this continuing legacy.

Lois asked for a review of the newest kind of meeting, "The Circle of Learning". Board members commented particularly on member participation.

Our annual picnic will take place at the Marquardt Farm on June 18. This early change of date is to avoid a conflict with the Victoria Hardy Plant Group Study Weekend at the Mary Winspear Centre.

In March's Newsletter (actually written in mid-February) I wrote an article wondering how the unusually long, cold winter was going to affect our gardens. Linda and I hoped to get many emails from our members, to no avail.

So here are some observations from the ten people at April's Board of the Victoria Rhododendron Society meeting.

The general feeling was that Spring was delayed by a month or more. The record long cold spell was not especially destructive. Heavy snowfall that broke plants like the blizzard of 1997 fortunately did not happen.

The coldest temperatures in our gardens, -10C (not counting the wind chill factor) was recorded by Lois and Roy Blackmore up on Triangle Mountain.

Lois and a few other members noticed that the deer were munching on the new flowers and leaves of hellebore and eryathronium, something people had never seen before. I have noticed daffodils and members of the narcissus family remain untouched and form bright gold blooms in gardens and even in tangles of blackberries.

Carrie George and others commented there were many more rabbits than usual. However, Ann Allen and Ian Duncan near Prospect Lake and Bill and Theresa McMillan near Hatley Park in Colwood have native forests around them. They do not see rabbits. Native predatory birds of the forest such as owls and hawks hunt and eat them.

Squirrels can be real pests with tulips, digging up and eating the bulbs. Deer continue to be scourges of tulip flowers.

Lloyd Gilmore and others have found that rats move from the cold outdoors into heated greenhouses and proceed to eat many tender plants and precious seedlings.

We will be making more observations as spring progresses.

A week later: it is now April 9, 10 o'clock on a Sunday morning.
